It is a testimony to the power of persistence, education, and self-determination, while offering a vision of what is possible when refugees become part of the change that is needed. Gentille Meda Dusenge is a Congolese refugee, writer, and advocate whose life journey embodies resilience and purpose. Forced to flee the Democratic Republic of Congo in 1996, she grew up in Rwanda's Kiziba refugee camp, where she confronted the daily realities of displacement, poverty, and stigma. Her memoir traces her path from exclusion to empowerment through education.
